The National HLAA Convention is June 29 – July 1 in New Orleans. Our Rochester Chapter offers a reimbursement for costs to attend of up to \$750 dollars. Everyone should strive to attend at least one convention to get the full experience of all HLAA has to offer.

Our Summer Picnic is Sunday, August 13 at Dolomite Lodge – Penfield, NY. Mark your calendars for this casual gathering of good conversation and food...and no speeches!

Our major event of the year will be our 40th Anniversary Celebration to be held in late October. A group, led by Carol Loftus, has been formed to plan this event. If you attended our 30th, you know our 40th will also be memorable.

A PEAK AT THE FUTURE...

In February a panel discussion titled: <u>New World of</u> <u>Over-the-Counter Hearing Aids</u> was held at The Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas. Barbara Kelley, Executive Director of our National HLAA was one of the three panel members; joined by Frank Lin of Center of Hearing and Public Health, Johns Hopkins University, and John Luna of Nuheara (an OTC maker). Some of the observations go beyond OTC hearing aids...with impact on the whole marketplace.

OTC hearing aids, introduced in October, 2022, are just in their infancy - we are only at 'Step 1'.

The size of the potential market is expected to grow by tens of millions because currently the average age when one gets a traditional hearing aid for the first time is 72 years-of-age. Initial OTC results of Nuheara show an average age in the early '50s. The span between the two ages increases the potential customer base by tens of millions. That will bring mass market dollars for R&D and efficient high-tech manufacturing...substantially lowering per unit costs. It will also assure consistent high quality product design and reliability.

Determining degree of hearing loss instead of being self -perceived or by individual test is being addressed by the development of a 'hearing number'. The concept is to have every person get tested by a professional to determine his/her degree of hearing loss; with a specific number being assigned. This is a controversial concept, but as hearing loss is recognized as a health issue it will probably be adopted because the medical profession already uses numbers to describe severity of so many health related problems. Numbers won't replace the audiogram which is still captured in the initial test, but the customer won't need to understand and translate the graphical lines of the audiogram chart.

So as quality goes up, cost comes down, and testing leads to easily recognizable numbers, what next? The traditional professional channel for acquiring hearing aids is being augmented by a commercial channel for those with mild – moderate hearing loss. Professionals will still be essential for quality care for those with severe and profound loss...and, of course, Cochlear implants.

In-ear design is very popular, more so than traditional over-the-ear hearing aids. The in-ear aids are easier to insert and in the future may have as many and more features as over-the-ear. Bluetooth will be installed on all hearing aids; it's essential for wireless streaming and eventually may even replace t-coil loops.

Improved quality of hearing, even for those not yet using hearing aids, will be a major objective.

Customer education to be sensitive to hearing loss sooner rather than later will be essential – it will take time.

Since the markets are global impacting millions there will be many new entrants and much innovation. Professionals will be essential to address needs of those with severe and profound hearing loss and, importantly, to deal with the necessary software. Hopefully software will be more open so support of hearing aids will be possible across various manufacturers and models.

Frank Lin also advised the first major clinical studies linking hearing loss to the onset of dementia will be published this summer. These confirm hearing loss belongs in the medical health realm and hearing aids as medical devices.

In a few years Artificial Intelligence will impact hearing testing and hearing aid capabilities as separate technologies crossover providing capabilities not yet feasible.

Thanks for reading this short stroll into the future. All the observations were made verbally with no reference to verifying studies or documents. However, experience with 'disruptive technologies' of the past 50 years has proven that 'dreams 'of the future often come to be fruition sooner rather than later.

National Report

Earlier this week (the first week of April), an article

came across my e-mail that I think many of us will find interesting. The position paper is authored by HLAA Board of Directors member, Janice Blustein (MD, PhD), and two of her colleagues at New York University. The authors caution against media coverage that links hearing loss and dementia and advise that mes-



saging on this question should tone down the rhetoric (omit the words 'risk' and 'dementia') in order to not further 'stigmatize' wearers of hearing aids and cochlear implants in the workplace and elsewhere. My summary here is not intended to do justice to the authors' work; see the HLAA Rochester website to access their article. Agree or not with their thinking, it is worth the read on a topic that will be the subject of wider discussion over the next year.

In early April, Barbara Kelley reports from Rockville as follows (with paraphrasing).

- Staff is working hard with multiple tasks in front of them, including new website development; convention planning (to date, 169 registered, we are about 75 ahead of last year); annual report development; NIH grant submitted for funding for next five years of research symposia; work on database; interviewing for staff positions; meetings with corporate partners and CEOs of organizations (press release going out this week on 2023 partners), and much, much more. Staff is hard working and tasked to the max with the HLAA Strategic Plan to guide the work.
- Barbara Kelley attended the SensorionTM R&D Conference in Paris on April 6th. She was the introductory speaker, talking about HLAA's role in representing consumers. Sensorion covered her travel expenses and provided an honorarium to HLAA.
- The Cardin, Casey bill in the Senate would expand Medicaid and Medicare dental, vision, and hearing coverages. HLAA will support the bill although progress forward is unlikely with only Democrat sponsors on board at the outset.
- HLAA (Barbara, Lise and Brian) met with the FDA about OTC hearing aids and some of the consumer confusion about online retailers selling OTC hearing aids. The biggest problem is people not being able to get the information on the box about returns and whether it's a true OTC hearing aid or

a PSAP. In similar vein, questionable advertising claims and other issues have added to early customer uncertainty. HLAA has worked with others (ASHA, Hearing Industries Association, International Hearing Society) to provide suggestions for FDA use at their website.

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
