This Washington state law requires the use of captions on public access TV's. If you enter a restaurant, you should see captions on their TV's. If not, you can ask for that to happen. If you don't get a positive response, these are some actions you can take:

- 2. <u>Click Here</u> to file a complaint against a restaurant who is not complying with the ADA effective communications on public TV's.

Hearing loss is considered a disability under the ACAA and the ADA. Anyone self-identifying as a passenger with a disability, who needs additional time or assistance, must be allowed to board the airplane before other passengers. I always ask for that to have time to self-identify for my hearing loss to aircraft personnel. I explain that often I am not able to understand the announcements on board.

AUDITORY NEUROPATHY

Auditory neuropathy is a challenging hearing disorder in which the inner ear successfully detects sound but has a problem with sending signals from the ear to the brain, currently accounting for approximately 10% of cases of sensorineural hearing loss (SNHL) in children. Current state-of-the-art medical knowledge suggests that auditory neuropathies play a substantial role in hearing impairments and deafness, according to Lineage Cell Therapeutics. Click Here

BONE CONDUCTION HEARING DEVICES

There are three types of bone conduction hearing devices:

- Bone conduction hearing implants (abutment through the skin, surgically implanted).
- Bone conduction hearing implants (magnet under the skin, surgically implanted).
- Bone conduction hearing aids (soft headband, non-surgical).

There are several different manufacturers and types of bone conduction hearing systems on the market today. This technology is quickly evolving, so it is important to discuss your medical history and hearing loss with your otologist and audiologist to know what is the best option for you. What are **Open Captions**? They cannot be turned on or off. They are always on.

What are **Closed Captions**? They can be turned on or off.

CHROME BROWSER CAPTIONS

- Be sure you are in the Chrome Browser. The word Chrome will be in the upper left corner of the screen.
- Click on 3 dots (upper right corner) to the right of your profile picture
- Click on **Settings** in the left-hand menu. You may have to scroll down.
- Click on **Accessibility** in left-hand menu
- Click on toggle to the right of **Live Caption** it turns blue to indicate ON
- Close that window
- Audio/video on Chrome captions should appear automatically

SMARTPHONE ACCESSIBILITY CAPTIONS

Example: You could use the captions on your smartphone at the doctor's office

iPhone

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your iPhone or iPad.
- 2. Accessibility: Tap on Accessibility in the Settings menu.
- 3. Live Captions: Select **Live Captions** from the list of options.
- 4. Turn On Live Captions: Toggle the switch to turn on Live Captions.
- 5. Customize Appearance: Tap on **Appearance** to customize the text, size, and color of the captions.

Once activated, Live Captions will automatically transcribe spoken audio in apps like FaceTime, Podcasts, and even live conversations around you. Note: For live conversations, you will need to select the microphone icon on the popup on the screen.

Sound Recognition

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your iPhone or iPad.
- 2. Accessibility: Tap on **Accessibility** in the Settings menu.
- 3. Sound Recognition: Scroll down and select **Sound Recognition**"
- 4. Turn On Sound Recognition: Toggle the switch to turn on Sound Recognition. Note: When activating for the first time, you may need to download Sound Recognition first and follow the steps as prompted on your phone.
- 5. Choose Sounds: Tap on **Sounds** to select which sounds you want your device to listen to. Once activated, your device will notify you when it detects the selected sounds. You can also access Sound Recognition from the Control Center to turn it on or off or to change the sounds list1.

Real-Time Text (RTT) on your Apple phone, follow these steps:

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your iPhone.
- 2. Accessibility: Tap on **Accessibility** in the Settings menu.
- 3. RTT/TTY: Scroll down and select **RTT/TTY** under the Hearing" section.
- 4. Turn On RTT/TTY: Toggle the switch to turn on Software RTT/TTY.

- 5. Choose SIM Line: If you have a Dual SIM, select the SIM line you want to use for RTT/TTY calls.
- 6. Relay Number: Tap **Relay Number** and enter the phone number to use for relay calls.
- 7. Send Immediately: Toggle on **Send Immediately** to send each character as you type or turn it off to complete messages before sending.
- 8. Answer All Calls as RTT/TTY: Toggle this option if you want to answer and make all calls as RTT/TTY.
- 9. Hardware TTY: If you want to use an external TTY device, turn on **Hardware TTY** and connect your iPhone to the device using the iPhone TTY Adapter.
- 10. Once activated, you can start an RTT/TTY call by opening the Phone app, selecting a contact, and choosing RTT/TTY Call or RTT/TTY Relay Call.

Android

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your Android device.
- 2. Accessibility: Scroll down and tap on "Accessibility".
- 3. Hearing enhancements: Under Accessibility, click "Hearing enhancements"
- 4. Live Transcribe: Under the "Captions" heading, tap on "Live Transcribe".
- 5. Open Live Transcribe: Tap "Open Live Transcribe" to start the app.
- 6. Permissions: Allow the necessary permissions for the app to access your microphone.
- 7. Enable Shortcut: Toggle on the Live Transcribe shortcut to display a floating icon for easy access.

Once activated, Live Transcribe will transcribe spoken audio in real time, making it easier for people with hearing impairments to follow conversations.

Sound Notifications

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your Android device.
- 2. Accessibility: Scroll down and tap on Accessibility
- 3. Hearing enhancements: Under Accessibility, click Hearing enhancements
- 4. Sound Notifications: Under the "Sound Notifications" heading, tap on "Sound Notifications".
- 5. Open Sound Notifications: Tap **Open Sound Notifications** to start the app.
- 6. Permissions: Allow the necessary permissions for the app to access your microphone.
- 7. Enable Shortcut: Toggle on the Sound Notifications shortcut to display a floating icon for easy access.
- 8. Choose Sounds: Select which sounds you want to be notified about from categories like emergency, priority, and appliances.

Once activated, Sound Notifications will alert you when it detects the selected sounds. You can also customize how you are notified for each sound category, such as vibration, flash, or watch notification

Real-Time Text (RTT)

- 1. Open Settings: Go to the Settings app on your Android device.
- 2. Accessibility: Scroll down and tap on **Accessibility**.
- 3. Hearing enhancements: Under Accessibility, click Hearing enhancements.
- 4. Real-Time Text (RTT): Under the Captions heading, tap on Real-Time Text (RTT)
- 5. Turn On RTT: Toggle the switch to turn on RTT.
- 6. Choose Visibility: Select "Visible during call" or "Always visible" to determine when the RTT option is available.
- 7. Make a Call with RTT: Open the Phone app, select a contact, and tap "RTT" to start a call.

Once activated, you can use RTT to type and read text messages during phone calls in real-time.

CELLPHONE CALLS WITH CAPTIONS

In comparing them, here are some questions to ask:

- Does the captioning contain both sides of the conversation?
- Can I save and send a transcript of the call?
- To receive calls, can I use my own phone number, or do I need to use a different app phone number?
- Is 3-way calling available?
- What languages are supported?

LANDLINE PHONES

These phones have a stronger volume control and voice to text captioning for the incoming calls. They can be installed at Panorama and are free to those with hearing loss. Please keep your Panorama phone, which can be used during an emergency. Put this other phone on another line so you can choose to answer the Panorama phone or the Caption phone. Some of these phones require that you have internet access. Normally, you will need to get the company's form signed by medical personnel to certify that you are hard of hearing. Call the company to arrange a date for installation. You can enter a work order and let Panorama know that this phone is being installed by the company personnel. The company will bring out the phone to your place of residence, install it and show you how to use it.

HEARING ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY

Hearing Assistive Technology (HAT) includes personal amplifiers, safety alerting devices, doorbells, personal FMs, and assistive listening systems, to name a few.

Be sure to ask for **Telecoil and Bluetooth** to be installed in your new hearing instruments. Why both? Each **turns your hearing aids into headphones**, but each technology is used in different hearing situations. With both installed, you have the benefit of hearing well in multiple environments. In my experience, the quality & clarity of the sound are the same for both technologies, using their respective ideal situations.

Here is a chart to send sound directly into your hearing instruments via Bluetooth and Telecoil.

Ease of turning it on/off?	Once paired, Bluetooth automatically activates	You manually activate the telecoil program setting to turn it on or off.

To explore hearing assistive technology, I would start with the free or generic technology that crosses most brands/models of hearing aids (telecoil) and then move up to pricier equipment, as needed.

Hearing instruments have limitations and may not be enough in all situations

Once you purchase a hearing aid, you may soon discover there are situations where you still need extra help to hear. "For example, my mother lived with me, and I wore hearing aids. But

her voice was so soft I could not hear her well. I purchased a "Bluetooth clip-on microphone", which she wore daily at home. It solved my problem as I could hear her perfectly, even as she whispered from the other room.

HOSPITAL EXPERIENCES

St Joseph's, Bellingham, WA

Sept 2024 "I had surgery in Bellingham. The entire experience was SO POSITIVE I'd go there again in a minute! Personnel had contacted me 3 times by phone before I arrived. When I checked in, they immediately gave me a rather large name tag that said, hard of hearing or deaf. EVERY person I talked to was aware of what I needed as a hearing-impaired person.

The admitting clerk came around from behind her desk and brought a chair to face-to-face to ask me questions. Then, the OR nurse positioned me right next to her as she asked further questions and entered the data into her computer. My doctor knew I was hearing-impaired and took off her mask to talk with me before I went into surgery. I wanted to make sure to talk to the anesthesiologist and he ALSO came right to my eye level, removed his mask and we talked."

EVERY person I encountered knew I was hearing-impaired and made accommodations for me. The recovery room nurse got right up next to me to communicate and then the male nurse (I

love that lower voice) spoke to me directly, watching my face all the time as I prepared to be discharged.

It was a hearing-impaired person's dream during the whole experience. All the advocacy work we all do IS ACTUALLY WORKING!! Just wanted to share this because it was SO awesome." (Erlene)


There are 2 screens in front. The left screen is connected to Zoom. You need the Zoom ID and Passcode to join a Zoom meeting (as host).

SPEECH IN NOISE TEST

QuickSIN Test (SIN=Speech in Noise) Audiologists can give you a test to assess your ability to hear speech in background noise. This QuickSIN Test can be given along with your hearing test — but you must ask for it. That score normally appears at the top of your audiogram. For an explanation of the QuickSIN test, <u>Click Here</u>

Compare your score to this chart:

SNR-Loss 0-3 dB	Normal/Near Normal
SNR-Loss 3-7 dB	Mild SIN Disability
SNR-Loss 7-15 dB	Moderate SIN Disability
SNR-Loss >15 dB	Severe SIN Disability

Table 1. Guidelines for interpreting QuickSIN test results.

The interesting thing is that your ability to hear speech in noise is a completely different measurement than the Audiogram chart. Some people with normal hearing can have more difficulty with this than some people that have a hearing loss! Here is the research presentation

TELECOIL

A telecoil is a small copper coil installed inside your hearing instrument. Telecoil turns your hearing aids into virtual headphones by sending the microphone sound directly into your hearing instrument. You need to be inside a "hearing loop" to activate it. There are many kinds of loops: room loops, neck loops, portable counter loops, etc. You can use telecoil at home or in public.

If a public venue does not have a room loop installed, their assistive hearing technology may involve handing out a neckloop -- if you have telecoil, which connects to FM or infrared technology.
