Over-the-Counter hearing aids are here!

On October 17th, a new era in hearing aids began. After years of delay and wrangling, Over-the Counter (OTC) hearing aids were approved by the Food and Drug Administration for sale to persons with mild-tomoderate hearing loss without a prescription. A flurry of activity emerged as this new regulation presented opportunity to market hearing aids to millions of people with hearing loss previously unreachable; the cost of prescription hearing aids is a barrier because many can't afford them, also many with mild-to-moderate loss just refuse to even consider spending that amount of money.

This change of opening hearing aids into a competitive marketplace is revolutionary. Potential for large numbers of new customers invites new manufacturers to participate in the dynamics of mass market volumes. It drives change in pricing, new innovation in features, even making wearing hearing aids more acceptable.

There are problems, however. Hearing aids are complex devices that need to be compatible with the unique characteristics of the user to be effective. If the user does not benefit the OTC will end up being placed

in the drawer instead of in their ears. That can harm the reputation of all hearing aids and lead to further customer resistance.

Why is This Important? Since most readers of this newsletter already have hearing aids we will be challenged to speak knowledgeably about OTCs...by family and friends, neighbors and business associates. The HLAA National office has been advocating for OTCs for years and became meaningful participants in standards development. Locally, our Tech Team has been working to develop tips for consumers to help buyers understand what to look for, and, importantly, cautions to be aware of. They are generalized universal tips, not specific to any hearing aid product – we don't have the resources to expedite product reviews.

<u>What We Recommend</u> The HLAA office also has published a tip sheet which is at the heart of what we have published in printed form. We extended it with more detail on our website at

hearinglossrochester.org. To potential buyers we emphasize three points: Get tested by a hearing professional so you know the specific level of your hearing loss; make sure there is a Trial Period – we recommend 45 days; and a Return Policy that refunds all your money in cash, not credit.

We have also added 'notes' to explain each tip presented. These should help the buyer navigate the various tips to determine which are most important to him or her. You can see all this material by going to our website homepage and with one click on "OTC Hearing Aids" you'll be connected to new site that is easy to navigate. The site was developed by members of our **Tech Team.**

We hope this information is helpful in understanding the complexities of OTCs. As always, your suggestions and comments are most welcome.

We All Have Hearing Aids ... Why Did We Include the OTC Glossy?

We know that most of our members have hearing aids or Cochlear Implants. So you may ask, why did the chapter go to great lengths to include a full-color glossy flyer with tips from our national office with expanded explanations from our own Tech Team?



How many times have you been with some friends at an activity, maybe a bridge game, Mah Jongg, knitting group, or whatever, and you KNOW that one of your friends needs hearing assistance? And if you've been brave enough to mention it to them, the answer is often, "they're too expensive".

For many years, National HLAA has lobbied the FDA, FTC, and Congress for the ability of appropriate retail establishments to sell Over-the-Counter (OTC) hearing aids. We mean by that, real hearing aids that can be adjusted to suit one's hearing loss with high quality amplification and with government testing and approval that they do what they say they do. Not those things that look like hearing aids for a hundred dollars and are really low-quality sound amplifiers.

We got our wish, the FDA approved regulations, and OTC hearing aids are starting to appear in some drug stores, big-box stores, and on-line. But they have a restriction – they are meant to treat low to moderate hearing loss.

Now we can tell our friend, you don't need to spend a couple thousand. Maybe a few hundred. But then the problem becomes, "which one".

But they need to know if they have a low-to-moderate hearing loss. Some audiologists are offering a hearing test package to let you know if an OTC hearing aid will work, and, if not, what other options may be. Many of the Medicare Part C plans next year should cover the cost. Check your plan to be sure.

That's where our full-color glossy flyer comes in. It's not for you (but you ought to review it). It's for you to give to your friend to educate him/her about what OTC hearing aids are all about, and what to look for and what to avoid while shopping for them.

Over the counter hearing aids have received extensive publicity since their recent rollout. They can be purchased without a prescription or consulting an audiologist. HLAA National Board of Directors member Peter Fackler updates Rochester chapter members



on HLAA's national activities including reactions to over the counter hearing aids, technology, broader advocacy and influence for people with hearing loss.

Fackler earned degrees from Duke University and the University of Michigan. Following a five-year stint with the audit staff of Price Waterhouse & Co. (now PwC) he embarked on a 30 plus year career in higher education financial management, including a six-year appointment at Bates College as vice president and chief financial officer. He served two terms on the HLAA Board of Directors where he was treasurer and chair, rejoining the Board in 2017. He is also a past president of the Rochester Chapter and is a bilateral cochlear implant user.

"Big Read" Coming to NTID in April

Throughout the month of April 2023 the Monroe County Library System (MCLS) is partnering with RIT/NTID to host a National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) Big Read featuring Ilya Kaminsky's *Deaf Republic: Poems*. Copies are available in many MCLS libraries.

The book takes place in an unspecified time of political unrest in an occupied territory. The story unfolds in episodic poems, opening with the shooting of a young deaf boy at a protest. In response, the entire town adopts deafness as a strategy of resistance. The poems explore how language enables resistance to power and how the lives of the townspeople are scarred by political violence. The author is a hard-of-hearing Ukrainian immigrant who grew up in Rochester. Ilya's family was given political asylum due to anti-semitism. Currently Professor Kaminsky is the Bourne Chair of Poetry at Georgia Tech's School of Literature, Media, and Communications.

A variety of programs including book discussions, poetry workshops and readings, ASL performances of the poems, and art exhibits, will be held at area libraries and at other RIT colleges.

The HLAA Rochester Chapter of will be participating in this program.

The wealth of information available on our Website about OTC hearing aids, the Tip Sheet, and the separate OTC Website available from our main Website, indicate how blessed our chapter is to have such an amazing group of volunteers to put it all together. Please read below:

"Here are some updates from the *HLAA New York State Association*, (HLAA-NYSA). *Jerry Bergman*, past president & *leader of the Advocacy & Legislative Committee*, has started a petition on change.org titled "Establishing the Commission for the Deaf, DeafBlind and Hard of Hearing in New York State." Jerry and his advocacy team are requesting everyone to sign the petition needed to get *Governor Hochul's* attention. We'll need well over 100 signatures to do this. To sign the petition please visit the New York Association's website: www.hearinglossnys.org. Sign today, if possible! Please share the information with others and ask them to sign as well. This is the time to be heard!"

The Executive Director of *HLAA*, *Barbara Kelley*, wrote a letter urging our Governor to sign this bill. You can do the same! The more that write to our governor the more likely we will be heard. If this year comes to an end without a signed bill, we will all be back to the drawing board. We will continue to be one of only 12 states without such commission!

In next month's update I plan to share key points that came out of the December *HLAA NYSA* Board of Director's meeting.

Purchasing recommendations:

Testing—Get tested by a hearing professional to determine your level of hearing loss. **Trial period**—At least 45 days. **Return policy**—Full refund.

Considering OTC Hearing Aids? HLAA's OTC Tip Sheet Can Help

What is "mild to moderate" hearing loss?

You may have mild to moderate hearing loss if...

- You have trouble understanding conversations in groups, with background noise, or when you can't see who is talking.
- You have trouble hearing on the telephone.
- You need to turn up the volume of television, or radio loud enough for others to complain.
- Your friends or family complain that you don't understand speech, and ask them to repeat often.

OTC may NOT help you if...

- You also have trouble hearing conversations in quiet environments.
- You also have trouble hearing loud sounds like power tools, or motor vehicles.

If you experience these, you should see a hearing care professional.

Important questions to ask about OTC hearing aids

- Is there a free trial period, or money back return policy?
- Does it need a smartphone, app, or computer to install, operate, or customize to my needs?
- Is it compatible with cellphones, or smartphones?
- Does it have connectivity via Bluetooth, or telecoil to a smartphone, computer, or listening system?
- Can the hearing aid's amplification be adjusted?
- Is it water/sweat resistant?
- How does it control, reduce, or block out background, or wind noise?
- How long is the battery life? Can it be recharged?

Other considerations

- Pay attention to package warnings. If you have pain, sudden hearing changes, or dizziness, see a doctor.
- It may take time to adjust to hearing devices.
- If the first hearing aid doesn't work, keep trying, and you may want to seek the help of a hearing care professional to advise you.

Paddy's Deaf Wife

Paddy feared his wife Mary wasn't hearing as well as she used to and thought she might need a hearing aid.

Not quite sure how to approach her, he called the family doctor to discuss the problem.

The doctor told him there is a simple informal test that Paddy could perform to give the doctor a better idea about her hearing loss.

Here's what you do said the doctor. "Stand about 40 feet away from her and in a normal speaking tone see if she hears you. If she doesn't, go to 30 feet away and then 20 feet and so on until you get a response."

Later that day when Paddy gets home from the pub, he sees Mary in the kitchen cooking dinner and he was in the hallway,

He thinks to himself, I'm about 40 feet away let's see what happens.

In a normal tone, he asks, "Mary what's for dinner my lovely?"

No response so he moves closer 30 feet he says" Mary, what's for dinner?" Still no response.

He moves closer about 20 feet. "Mary, for gosh sakes, can ye be telling me what's for dinner?" Still nothing and again at 10 feet still nothing.

So he walks up behind her and says "Mary, can you tell me what's for dinner?"

She replied, "Gee whiz Paddy. For the fifth time, Chicken!!!"

T-COIL NOTIFICATION CARDS

Now that we can once again meet in person, HLAA Rochester has printed a new supply of blue and white cards to alert people of accessibility to a telecoil in public buildings, especially in Houses of Worship.



The cards are available on the library table at our meetings. Please take them and introduce them to the

staff at your House of Worship. Many such locations have T-coil accessibility, but often the greeters or ushers are not aware of them. It is important to explain to the staff that these people should know that members with hearing loss depend on T-coils to connect with speakers. Sometimes they are available in only sections of the building, so the greeters or ushers should be trained to know that.

The cards should be placed at eye level at the entrances to the building. It is also helpful for the weekly bulletins to notify members of the availability of enhanced listening devices, whether T-coil or other technology, such as FM or Infrared. All such devices need to be checked from time to time to be sure they are working properly.

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
