chapter members on struggles and successes at headquarters during this unusual year. HLAA "went virtual" for a cancelled convention, all the Walks4Hearing, and ongoing webinars. Staff moved to a new location after decades in Bethesda. "Global standards for cochlear implant users," a major collaborative study, was published in JAMA. Pete reveals how the national office continues supporting people with hearing loss.

Pete Fackler earned degrees from Duke University and the University of Michigan, embarking on a five year tenure with Price Waterhouse & Co. followed by over thirty years in higher education executive positions. He served two terms on the HLAA Board of Trustees where he was Treasurer and President of the Board, rejoining the Board in 2017. He chaired the Rochester Walk4Hearing for several years and he is now the Coordinator of the Cochlear Implant Group. and a bilateral cochlear implant user.

This November 27, 2020, marks our organization's founding in 1979. Founder **Rocky Stone** began our organization as Self Help for Hard of Hearing People, a moniker of the times when the self-help movement was gaining ground. The first SHHH Chapter was established in Gainesville, Georgia.

The philosophy envisioned back then is still alive today – gather all the information you can to make your own decisions about your hearing health ("self-help"), then turn around and help others. This is in practice in HLAA Chapters across the country where you provide information and peer-to-peer support.

Dr Barnett Receives URMC's Satcher Award

The Satcher Community Health Improvement Awards recognizes University of Rochester Medical Center faculty and staff for significant contributions to the health of the community through research, teaching, practice, and/or service programs.

The awards reflect the mission of the Center for Community Health & Prevention and the URMC to develop and expand communityuniversity partnerships that support communityengaged research and interventions that reduce health inequities and improve the community's health. Awards are made based on work done in the greater Rochester area and Finger Lakes region.

The Dr. David Satcher Community Health Improvement Awards are typically held in person with a keynote speaker, but this year, due to the pandemic, awardees are being recognized and sharing their commitment to community health improvement virtually.

Dr. Steven L. Barnett, M.D., a member of the HLAA Rochester Chapter, was one of 4 recipi-



ents of the Satcher Award this year.

Dr. Barnett directs the Rochester Prevention Research Center (RPRC): National Center for Deaf Health Research (NCDHR) and in that capacity has engaged and partnered with populations of Deaf sign

language users and people with hearing loss in Rochester and nationally to collaboratively identify and address health priorities with those communities. RPRC/NCDHR and community partners conducted the first-ever broad public health surveillance in American Sign Language, called the Rochester Deaf Health Survey. This community partnered process represents the first time that a Deaf community used its own data to identify health priorities, and led to intervention research.

RPRC/NCDHR successfully conducted the first-ever randomized pragmatic trial of a healthy lifestyle program called Deaf Weight Wise. This collaborative work with Rochester Deaf communities demonstrated that an evidence-based intervention adapted by Deaf people, implemented by Deaf people, and rigorously evaluated by Deaf people, results in significant and sustained weight loss. Additionally, RPRC/NCDHR partnered with Deaf community members, Trillium Health and the New York State Department of Health to address access to walk-in HIV testing through a novel telehealth pilot program to connect via video a credentialed counselor who is Deaf with a Deaf walk-in client.

RPRC/NCDHR and the Healthy Living with Hearing Loss (HL2) Community Committee used a community-engaged process with people with hearing loss in Rochester to identify health research priorities, and are now conducting a feasibility pilot to address social determinants of health. RPRC/NCDHR is beginning its fourth consecutive 5-year award as a CDCfunded Prevention Research Center, and will conduct Deaf Weight Wise implementation research with community partners in Rochester, Buffalo and Syracuse.

MY STORY

I had heard of HLAA in Rochester from Janet McKenna and wanted to attend a meeting to learn more about the group. Later, it was **Carmel** Merrill who invited me to one in February 2020. I met several members, found it very interesting, and became a



member on the spot, planning to continue attending future gatherings. Some time later, I met with Susan Miller, fast becoming a good friend, who encouraged me to write this for HLAA's monthly newsletter.

If you are wondering about how to pronounce my name, here's an easy way: Burr-joo-he. It is an old Armenian name.

I was born in Alexandria, Egypt, of Armenian descent. I am an immigrant and a naturalized citizen. I arrived in the United States in October of 1963 at the age of 30 fully equipped to speak English (I had a degree in Education and had taught English at the high school level at the American College for Girls in Cairo, and an Armenian high school in Beirut, Lebanon). In spite of my love of teaching, I built a 30-year career at The Lawyers Co-operative Publishing Company in Rochester. I loved my various positions and also became the favorite friend of the many hearing-impaired employees who worked in the various departments. I learned American Sign Language with the help of one of my proofreaders.

I now realize that "hearing and non-hearing" weaved through my life in ways I never dreamed.

When I first came to the US, I was determined to continue my teaching career and finish my Master's degree. One of my co-workers had a daughter who was deaf from childhood which got me interested in the Rochester School for the Deaf. I went to Gallaudet College to investigate studying there. Since I was not a citizen yet, I was told that I did not qualify for scholarships available to the students. In the

1960s, I couldn't afford the \$500 needed. Teaching the deaf was not to be.

In later years, when I became the supervisor of the Proofreading Department, I had three hearing-impaired employees. As the industry transitioned from "hot metal" to electronic publishing, hearing-impaired employees who had worked in the manufacturing departments-the noisiest part of the business—were trained to work in other areas. This brought me closer to working and understanding the needs of their handicap.

As the years went by and I started aging, it became harder to climb stairs, to stand up straight, to wake up full of energy, and periodically to raise the volume on my television. I mildly wondered if I was beginning to lose my hearing. No. People were speaking softly and fast.

Several years after I retired from active work, I moved into Brickstone by St. John's Living, a very active senior community. Lectures, concerts, parties, and lots of courses offered by our city's colleges and universities.

I attended a course and noticed that I was barely hearing the lecturer and missing almost all conversations by the attendees. I realized that I had to do something about "my hearing loss."

But the hardest was not hearing music correctly. Any melody or tune that was not live became unpleasant sound. I stopped listening to the music channels on cable TV.

It was time to take serious steps of being evaluated and fitted with hearing aids. Five years ago I was "moderately" impaired. My condition is now moving closer to "severely."

The funny thing is that the real me does not realize that from time to time this body needs some parts repaired and even replaced. In spite of the passing years, I now found the time to make my dream come true. I wrote and published my memoir, So Many Homelands, the story of my years in Egypt, my life in the United States, and a story about Armenia, my ancestral homeland. It can be purchased on Amazon.
