PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Better Hearing = Better Living!



In 1961, Bob Dylan said, 'The Times They are a-Changin'. His words have been true ever since, perhaps more so now. The pace of change quickened over the decades - then Covid struck! As in-person meetings became impossible, we adopted Zoom to reach

members at home; it wasn't long before we saw new opportunities. As I outlined last month, we've expanded HLAA-Rochester's field of focus to include central and western New York. In addition to advertising across the region, we're now starting a series of presentations in libraries and adult living residences to introduce all that HLAA offers.

As you know, our chapter has traditionally been noted for *Support* through person-to-person socialization and advice. We intend to get back to that as soon as masking and social distancing directives allow. Our live monthly presentations will be both in person and on Zoom, (as we'd hoped to do this fall until the Delta Variant scrubbed our plans). We also intend to continue all the activities HLAA-Rochester has traditionally offered.

The pace of advances in technology is also picking up. New assistive listening devices (ALDs) are coming to market allowing users great flexibility at relatively low cost – particularly for those with moderate hearing loss. New sales channels are emerging largely on social media ...coupled with over-the-counter (OTC) federal standards expected to be approved next year. New product offerings, both by emerging companies as well as major manufacturers, may lead to impact on the design and features of hearing aids and ALDs. We at HLAA-Rochester intend to expand assistance to customers in what can become a confusing marketplace...a limitation being the extent that our resources will allow.

It's often jokingly said that HLAA is one of the best kept secrets in town because so many have never heard of us. Perhaps by reaching out that will change. More importantly, we may be of help to those putting off get-

Are You Satisfied with TV Closed Captioning?

I have a "hot button". It's the lack of closed captioning on many TV commercials and on some newscasts, where they have a "live report from the scene" which isn't pre-scripted.

Advertisements (commercials) that are less than five minutes long are not considered "video programming" and are, therefore, not required to have closed captions. Many businesses, however, caption their commercials voluntarily. Because captioning provides access to a commercial's message for millions of deaf and hard of hearing television viewers, and for English language learners, captioning commercials makes good business sense.

I'm pretty well convinced that lawyers and car dealers don't want our business. Very few of their TV ads are closed-captioned. And there's many national product and service ads which aren't captioned. And I am astonished that there are some TV ads for hearing aid providers which aren't captioned. I have written to some of these advertisers. One attorney called me, surprised by my letter, since he said he pays extra for his ad agency to caption his ads. Shortly afterwards, his ads were captioned.

Some stations have live CART captioning for their newscasts and local programming. But in smaller markets (like Rochester) they are allowed to use "Electronic Newsroom Technique" where they use the teleprompter text as the captions. But that doesn't work for live reports and weather forecasts.

The FCC is considering letting stations use automated captions, and would like your opinion about that,

If, like me, you'd like to see the FCC require ads to be captioned, that all parts of a newscast be captioned, and perhaps allow for automated captions, you can send them a "My experiences" message via their website. And if you have problems with the captioning on any specific broadcast or cable program, you can file a complaint at the website.

ting hearing aids, those considering getting them, those just beginning to wear them, and those having problems on a continuing basis. While there is value in making folks aware of HLAA, the immediate benefit is when someone who has a problem finds solutions by association with HLAA.

The new Express Hearing Check Kiosk will confirm for some their need for hearing help by experiencing the improvement available. After a minutes-long self-administered hearing test the user sees an audiogram of their hearing, and then hears a woman speaking as they hear now followed by how they will hear with correction. That's the WOW Factor! Our intent is to help folks understand the state of their hearing and, if necessary, urge them to see an audiologist. A few of our early users have been surprised as they listened and are on their way.

For those ready to buy hearing aids our new course *Getting a Hearing Aid ... what you need to know* in addition to being presented live periodically, will be available 24/7 on YouTube. And for those new to wearing hearing aids or having continuing difficulties and questions we offer our HOPE and Demo Center sessions.

.A major concern is having enough volunteers dedicated to covering all the bases. The prep work has been carried on during the pandemic – we plan to launch in the field as soon as the pandemic restrictions are lifted. So, we offer the opportunity to all who would like to volunteer for one of many specific positions that will make these new initiatives a success. Contact me, **Sue Miller**, or **Dan Brooks** if you'd like to discuss what your preference would be in these exciting new endeavors.

And let's not forget the Health Accessibility Task Force focused on effective communication between patients and medical professionals in clinical and hospital settings. Mary Chizuk, who is carrying the work forward welcomes assistance to expedite progress on the project.

OUR FOUNDER, HOWARD E. "ROCKY" STONE (1925-2004)

Founder's day for HLAA is celebrated in November each year. Howard E. "Rocky" Stone was born



in 1925 in Cincinnati, Ohio. He began working at an early age to help support his mother and two sisters during the Depression. During World War II military service at age 19, a nearby explosion resulted in a bilateral hearing loss. Following military discharge, he attended the University of

Southern California, where in 1949 he earned a degree in International Affairs. He then won a scholarship to the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, but did not complete the program because his hearing loss precluded him from taking the oral exams.

Recruited by the Central Intelligence Agency, he spent 25 years in federal service with assignments to half a dozen Near and Far East countries. On retirement in 1975, he received the agency's highest award, the Distinguished Intelligence Medal.

Because there were no services for hard of hearing people, Rocky founded SHHH in 1979, serving as its volunteer executive director until 1993. Having overcome the challenge of childhood poverty and a profound hearing loss, Rocky believed in the ability of individuals to help themselves; "I established SHHH as a membership organization run by people with hearing loss. We provide information necessary for them to make choices, but emphasize the choice must be theirs. The challenge is to develop togetherness within diversity."

Once we accept responsibility for ourselves, we have to learn to love ourselves, and then, each other. The thinking behind the self-help philosophy for SHHH was to enhance each of us as human beings.

Local chapters provide a community of people with hearing loss, help you to deal with the issue of hearing loss stigma, share technologies beyond hearing aids, empower you through the exchange of knowledge, encouragement and the sharing of experiences; and alleviate the despair and isolation of hearing loss through their support. During the November 2005 Board of Trustees meeting, the board voted to change the name of "Self Help for Hard of Hearing People" (SHHH) to "Hearing Loss Association of America" (HLAA). SHHH completed the transition to Hearing Loss Association of America in March 2006.

Tips for better communication at Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is one of my favorite holidays — delicious food, good spirits and lively gatherings of family and friends. But with my hearing loss, I sometimes worry I will miss out on some of the fun. Large dining room tables make conversation tricky, especially, like in my family, if everyone is talking at once. Background chatter combined with noise from the football games on television add to the overall din, making it a tough listening situation. What is a person with hearing loss to do?



- 1. Talk to your host in advance: Discuss your hearing issues with your host a week before Thanksgiving so she has time to accommodate your needs. Request to be seated in the middle of the table and with your back to a wall. The more specific you are, the better seat you will get.
- 2. **Limit background noise:** When I host, background music is kept to a minimum. While your host may like to play music or keep the TV on for the game, perhaps you can ask him or her to reduce the volume during dinner.
- 3. Converse strategically: Don't try to participate in conversations across large distances. Speak with the people seated near you at the table. If you want to speak with someone else, move nearer to him, or ask to continue the conversation when you have a chance to be closer together.
- 4. **Optimize your hearing aids:** Many hearing aids have special settings for restaurants or other loud places. Experiment with a couple of different settings to find what is optimal. You can practice at home if you don't want to spend time experimenting at the event.

- 5. **Try new technologies:** Many gadgets are now available that can help you hear in a group setting including personal FM systems, Roger pens, or even chair loops. Experimenting with new technology can be fun for everyone.
- 6. **Be kind to yourself:** Take breaks to minimize hearing loss exhaustion. Head to the restroom, or find a quiet spot in another room or outside. Breaks give your ears and brain a rest and build your energy for more socializing.
- 7. **Don't fake it:** It can be tempting to nod along and pretend you hear what others are saying or laugh just because others are laughing. But it can be dangerous, particularly if someone is asking you a question. Be brave and be honest with others if you are having trouble hearing. It will make your interactions more memorable for everyone.
- 8. Use visual clues to indicate if you are having trouble hearing: Cupping your ear with your hand to indicate to the speaker to speak louder works well and does not interrupt the flow of the conversation for others.
- 9. Laugh at the mishearings: It is inevitable that you will hear something incorrectly or reply to a question you thought you heard rather than the actual question. Bring your sense of humor and others will too. Sometimes these misfires can be hilarious.

And most importantly, enjoy the moment! It can be hard to keep it all in perspective during the holidays if you feel like you are missing out on the fun. Try to be grateful for the wonderful friends and family around you. You may not hear every word they say, but you can partake in all of the good feelings around the table. Happy Thanksgiving!


