Double panels for May: Cochlear Implants, and Ask the Audiologists

Two panel discussions are featured for HLAA/Rochester's May meetings. Depending on the severity of your hearing loss, you can discover more about cochlear implants and/or hearing aids.

Tuesday, May 7th, Daytime meeting 11:00am

"LIVING AND HEARING WITH COCHLEAR IMPLANTS"

About twenty members of HLAA/Rochester have cochlear implants, and several people have one for each ear!

A severely to profoundly deafened individual benefiting little from hearing aids may wish to consider the surgically implanted prosthesis which bypasses a damaged inner ear to send electrical impulses directly to the brain.

Although cochlear implants now are more extensively publicized than previously, conflict and misinformation still exist about them. The four late-deafened adults on our cochlear implant panel relate their histories of living and hearing with six cochlear implants and two hearing aids among them. Two panelists are CI pioneers. All their experiences differ.

Panelists are: Al Suffredini from Canandiagua, first implanted 1993, second implant 2012, Cochlear Amer.

Janet McKenna, all the way from Grand Island, first implanted 1998, second implant 2012, Advanced Bionics.

Jimmie Sorrento from Tonawanda, implanted in 2003, (uses a hearing aid in his unimplanted ear), Advanced Bionics.

Ginger Graham from Webster, implanted in 2010, (also uses a hearing aid), Cochlear America.

Among the topics they will touch on are: their reasons for undergoing an implant, surgery, hookup, insurance issues, and functioning in the real world. This is a unique opportunity to learn how cochlear implants have impacted the adults who use them daily.

ASK THE AUDIOLOGISTS

Let's learn about hearing aids. A trio of experienced Audiologists takes the floor for the approximately annual "Ask the Audiologists" panel question and answer session. As with previous hugely popular and informative "Ask the Audiologists" presentations, it is completely impromptu and unrehearsed.

The panelists are prepared to field your questions on all aspects of hearing aids and hearing loss. As hearing aid dispensers, they can comment on new developments in hearing aid technology, deafness, audiograms, etc.

Panelist are: **Carol Henn-Staino**, AuD from Arizona School of Health Sciences, Audiologist with Rochester Hearing and Speech Center.

Christine Stein, AuD from University of Florida, Audiologist at Professional Hearing Solutions in Victor.

Jared Teter, AuD from University of Florida, Audiologist at Hearcare Hearing in Penfield.

This is a great opportunity to query the experts. Come prepared with your questions! If they can't provide immediate answers, they will follow up.

The book is about her search of why and how she lost her hearing and she presents informed and accurate details about many aspects of hearing loss: anatomy, noise exposure, ototoxins, environmental influences, and so on. And above all, she writes in a comfortable way about all the feelings, frustrations, anxieties with which we are all familiar. Curling up with this book is like spending a couple of hours with a good friend (especially one who understands the difference between hearing and understanding what is being said).

"YELLOW DOT" PROGRAM

A new program was started by the NYS Sheriff's Association. It helps <u>Emergency Responders provide</u> <u>prompt care</u> in the event of a car accident by placing your medical emergency info inside your glove box.

You place the <u>yellow dot on the rear window, driver's</u> <u>side</u>, and it will alert EMTs to look in the glove box for your medical info. The yellow sheet of medical info that you fill out is easy to do.

(The yellow dot decal can also be placed on or beside your front door. An Emergency Responder will look in your freezer for the medical info.)

HEARING LOOP INSTALLATION U of R Medical Center Saunders Building, NCDHR Conference Room

A hearing loop called a Super Loop System (SLS), with HiFi quality sound, has been installed in the lower level **NCDHR conference room (B309 and B311)** providing individuals with cochlear implants and/or hearing aids communication accessibility to meetings and instructional programs. This is a first on the U of R campus, and has been a hit with <u>Healthy Living with Hearing Loss (HL2)</u>, a Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR) committee that works closely with NCDHR. A second SLS hearing loop system is planned for room 1416.

A hearing loop creates a magnetic field that is picked up by a T-coil located in a hearing aid or cochlear implant, delivering a clear speech signal absent of conflicting room noise. The unique hearing loop design, utilizing a series of figure 8 hearing loops, was applied to the concrete floor just before carpet installation. The advantage of an SLS design is that it eliminates signal spill into the adjoining corridor and office areas <u>assuring</u> <u>meeting confidentially</u>. The SLS design also offers a very even 3D signal level within the meeting room eliminating user head tilt issues.

The hearing loop design, included as part of the NCDHR office area renovation, was completed by SWBR Architects, 387 East Main Street, Rochester, NY. Don Bataille, AIA, CCS, Architect and hearing loop designer, noted the advantage for building owners is that hearing loops provide a superior sound quality without the need to maintain other redundant or encumbering equipment. CAPTIONS IN MOVIE THEATRES

<u>Closed captioning in movie theaters is now the law</u> under the Americans with Disabilities Act. Theaters are now required to convert all of their movie screens with rare exceptions. Of the four largest movie chains in the US, Regal Cinemas is by far the largest, with more than 544 movie theaters.

To date, Regal has provided captioned movies in more than 225 of its theaters and promises to have all converted by end of the year. AMC Theaters, the second largest, has just started converting. Cinemark Theatres, the third largest chain, has already converted all of its theaters in the US, and Carmike Cinemas (4th largest) has converted all of its movie theaters in Pennsylvania and is now doing so throughout the US.

It is anticipated that all four major chains will have converted all of their movie theaters and screens to closed captioning via one of several captioning devices by the end of the year. So the next time you go to the movies, be sure to ask the ticket seller for their closed captioning device, and don't be shy about saying "Show me the Captions."

BEHIND THE SCENE AUDIOLOGIST INTERVENTION CHART NOTES (VERSUS AN ON-LINE PURCHASE) FOR HEARING AIDS

(from a local Audiologist)



Following chart notes are for only <u>two of</u> <u>the four patients seen in one-half day</u> <u>recently</u>. It took a little over 1 hour to complete chart notes and correspondence for the four "straight- forward" visits, two of which are listed here.

"Richard" (new patient, recently received hearing aids)

He reported several issues and asked what could be done. A woman's sharp voice at Dunkin Donuts being intrusive; other instances of being bothered by background noise. Retention issue Left, and report that hearing varies. HA use analysis showed average use of 6.7 hrs/day and much of it in noisy situations. Little use at home, in quiet. Counseled re: importance of full-time use, activated mute function, counseled muting one HA if bothered by intrusive voices. He was counseled re: nature of background noise management by broadcast and entertainment industries and how it's different for hearing aids. Changed to #4 M speakers for retention issue. Seemed better in office. Plan: Follow-up visit as scheduled in 2 weeks.

"Dan" (long-term patient)

 5^{th} follow-up visit. Reports he is not hearing as well as he was with his old hearing aids. Also, comments from his wife and their daughter to the same effect. Changed identity to calm, and made (compression) as linear as possible, then increased gain 3 clicks for all frequencies, then increased gain for loud and moderate level sounds 3 clicks more for 1.5 kHz – 3 kHz. No feedback, no issues with clatter sound. Compared (visually) sound field results with previous HAs and they line up well, within 5 dB, but generally poorer with new instruments before the above-mentioned changes. Plan: Return visit 2 weeks for follow-up.

Hearing aid fitting is not a simple process and this was one half of an EASY half day!

Note: It should be kept in mind that under the current delivery model user satisfaction has hovered around 66% for the last 20 + years, with possibly as many as 20% or more hearing aids in the drawer. This is not good, but one can only imagine what user satisfaction rates might be for hearing aids purchased on-line without assistance from a knowledgeable third party.
